Victoria Gardens 1887

The ability to search the digitised newspaper database (TROVE) of the National Library reveals interesting information on Victoria Gardens. One such entry from "A Lover of the Beautiful" appeared in *The Telegraph, St Kilda, Prahran and South Yarra Guardian* on Saturday 18 June 1887.

THE VICTORIA GARDENS.

Sir,-Seeing a paragraph in your last issue that they were beautifying the above gardens, I wended my way to the locality expecting to see something grand. To my surprise I found the two principal sights had already been named the one Mount Folly and the other Lake Forbes. (I presume you were not invited to partake of the champagne, or you would have mentioned it.) Before proceeding further, let me say I am not one of the grumblers who object to having Public Gardens; I bave always thought Prahran was a long way behind other places in this respect; and it is a great pity ground was not secured earlier, when we could have had recreation places suitable, and on a scale worthy of so great a city. My objection, Sir, is not to the gardens, but to the way in which they are being laid out. The design might have passed had the ground been twen'y acres instead of four. I know there are certain classes who should not see things half done; but I also know that an ugly thing however much adorned cannot be made to look well. I must confess to be unable to describe this wonderful Mount as it should be done, and would therefore request all your readers, who are interested in the welfare of their city, to come and see for themselves. It is a huge mass of earth some twenty feet high stuck in a corner of the ground; and when I saw it they were placing stones on one side fearing there might be a landelip some day. A short time ago an old gentleman (evidently not a Prahranite) asked me if it was a railway embankment they were making, and where it was going to. With regard to Lake Forbes, it covers a great part of the place, and though it had a lot of water in it, still it was scarcely deep enough to invite his Worship the Mayor and Councillors to a row on it.

"A LOVER OF THE BEAUTIFUL"

"Mount Folly" seen in the photograph below continued to be criticised and was eventually removed in the 1930. As for "Lake Forbes" this is the sunken oval and an important feature of the nineteenth century design. The soil from the oval was used to build the mound and is not dissimilar to the lake and mound in the Ripponlea Gardens.
